Many people are finding things tough at the moment due to rising goods and energy prices, inflation, and cost of living pressures. We know that people are worried and so we want to make sure that you are aware of the help that is available to you.

In response to this, last year we launched our Supporting You campaign, to highlight the range of support that is available – www.chichester.gov.uk/supportingyou

Since then, we've taken things a step further by introducing our dedicated Supporting You Team to help people with the cost of living and we've also introduced a service to help young people with their wellbeing.

#### **Supporting You Team**

This is a new holistic service specifically set up to support residents who are struggling with the cost of living.

The five-strong team of specialist, trained advisors work alongside services across the council to help people access a wide range of assistance including financial help to pay bills, help with housing, and health and wellbeing support.

The team has been put together in direct response to the current crisis. Last summer the council agreed to invest £300,000 in the pilot service over the next two years.

"One of the things we know is that, when people approach the council on a particular matter, it often becomes clear that there are a number of related issues involving more than one council service," explains our Benefits Manager, Marlene Rogers. "We understand that for people experiencing these complex situations, it can be frustrating to have to deal with each service separately, and so our Supporting You team is here to assess what sort of help they need, and act as a bridge between different council services so that each person receives individual, tailored help that addresses all of their needs.

"The team can also help signpost people to our other partner organisations when they feel this is appropriate, such as Arun



and Chichester Citizens Advice, Arun and Chichester Food Partnership and the Community Hub.

"With spiralling household costs, we know that even more people are going to need support, so we're delighted to have the team on board. They have already been making a huge difference to many people in a short space of time."

In order to reach as many people as possible, the team have been attending a number of community activities and events across the district, including the food hubs operated by UK Harvest.

## **Chichester Youth Connections**

This brand new service aims to support the health and wellbeing of young people aged 13-19 and was set up in response to the negative impact that the pandemic has had on our district's young people.

It supports those who live or go to school in the Chichester District and who are looking for help with issues such as loneliness and isolation, improving self-confidence, and making connections with others. The team can also help young people find their next steps in education and employment.

Young people can access six to eight individual sessions that are specifically tailored to help address the issues that are most important to them. Through practical advice and signposting, the team connects individuals to the most appropriate support. This could include a counselling service; advice on careers, money or

housing; or activities that could lead to a new interest, such as sports or the arts.

"Sadly, we know that many young people have been adversely affected by the coronavirus pandemic because of interruptions to their education, lack of social connections and becoming isolated during national lockdowns," explains Pam Bushby, Divisional Manager for Communities and Customer Services. "We also know that emotional health, including connections with others and support with the next steps in life, is just as important as physical wellbeing, and so this service will play a very important role.

### Council's £1m government funding bid is approved

Spending plans for £1 million of government funding for Chichester District have been approved by the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities.

Last year, we applied for a portion of the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) to spend up to March 2025, in order to encourage economic growth and improve quality of life for people across the district.

The spending plan, which was officially approved by the government just before Christmas, has four key aims:

- to boost the local economy;
- help local businesses grow and thrive;

• enable investment in community

 reduce barriers to employment and education.

The UKSPF is a government allocated fund of £2.6 billion that is intended to support places and communities through encouraging pride in the local area and increasing opportunities for residents and businesses. With that in mind, the council's bid includes a

particular focus on supporting projects that have been identified through the district's vision groups.

In addition, the council has applied for just over £718,000 of funding through the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF).

Council officers have worked closely with communities across the district to consider the types of issues which could be addressed using the fund. The funding will enable the council to offer additional grants to local businesses and community groups who will be able to submit bids for projects that meet the funding criteria.

### **Council updates** at your fingertips!

Finding out information about local council services has never been easier, thanks to the launch of a new free smartphone app, which we've launched in partnership with West Sussex County Council.

The Chichester District Council app means you can access council services on your mobile device and keep up-to-date with all of the latest council news and information.

#### The app enables you to:

- sign up to receive weekly reminders on recycling or waste collections, including our garden recycling service.
- search how and where items can be recycled at home or at the local recycling centre.
- complete 'Report It' forms for issues such as street cleaning, fly-tipping, or to request a new bin.
- find your nearest facilities, such as recycling centres, car parks and public
- view local food hygiene ratings for restaurants and cafes.
- read council news stories on important local issues.

"The app offers us the opportunity to provide residents with personalised updates and notifications on their waste and recycling collections. What

is particularly useful is that it enables us to let residents know if our crews are running late, and it allows us to notify them of planned changes to collections. The aim is to keep our residents well informed and to provide useful reminders," says Kevin Carter, the council's Divisional Manager for Contract Services. "Customers can also report issues on the app directly to us, including fly tipping, and they can even request a new bin. This makes this process much simpler and convenient, whether you are at home or out and about. The app also provides other useful council information, from local news, through to the food hygiene ratings of local restaurants and cafes."

The app also provides recycling advice and can help people to identify which items should go in which bins.


#### Top tip

## Here to help you

Believe it or not, you come into contact with council services every single day. Whether emptying your bins; educating your children; or looking after your local park, councils play an important role in your everyday life.

Living in Chichester District, you are supported by three different types of council: West Sussex County Council; Chichester District Council; and your local parish, town or city council. In the north of the district, there is also the South Downs National Park Authority, which is responsible for planning policies and planning applications within the park area.

We know that sometimes it can be confusing knowing who is responsible for what, and so we wanted to provide you with a simple guide to show what services each council provides.







#### www.westsussex.gov.uk

West Sussex County Council covers the whole of West Sussex and is responsible for:

- education, as well as services for children and families
- highways, including pavements, roads and transport (repair and maintenance, signage and parking restrictions)
- fire and public safety
- social care and public health



- setting the parking charges for the highway
- libraries
- waste management and disposal, including Chichester and Midhurst Household Recycling Centres
- trading standards
- planning for minerals and waste.

#### **Chichester District Council**

Chichester District Council covers the 303 square miles of the Chichester District and delivers more than 80 different services. These include:

#### Collecting your waste and recycling

Not only do we collect your waste and recycling, but we also deliver a range of additional services such as our garden recycling service; business waste and recycling services; as well as our textiles, small electricals and coffee pod recycling scheme. We are also responsible for street and footpath cleaning and litter management – and we even offer vehicle MOTs!

#### **Council tax and benefits**

We collect council tax on behalf of the councils that support you, as well as the Police and Crime Commissioner. Out of the money you pay, we keep around 8% of it, which amounts to £3.48 a week for the average Band D taxpayer. We also issue housing benefit and financial help for those who are struggling to pay their council tax and we collect business rates on behalf of the government.

#### **Planning and Building Control**

We prepare a Local Plan to manage and shape development. The plan also includes a wide range of planning policies to enable the council to determine planning applications, as well as protect our historic buildings and the natural environment. We also have a Planning Enforcement team which investigates breaches of planning rules. In the north of the district, is the South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA), which is responsible for planning policies and applications within the park area. We work closely with the SDNPA and we manage the planning application process for them in the Chichester part of the national park – www.southdowns.gov.uk

We also offer a building control service with officers visiting developments to assess building work controlled by the Building Regulations, and which deals with unauthorised works.

#### Housing

We are here to help support you if you need to access a roof over your head. Although we don't manage our own housing stock, we work with local housing associations to deliver affordable housing. We also manage the housing register, which you need to apply to if you need affordable housing. We also have a dedicated rough sleeper outreach team, which offers support and accommodation to those who are sleeping on the streets and we operate temporary accommodation for those who are at risk of homelessness. We also offer a range of grants and schemes, from disabled facility grants to

our Chichester Warm Home scheme, which aims to tackle fuel poverty.

#### **Parking and Public Conveniences**

As well as managing and maintaining our own car parks **www.chichester.gov. uk/carparks**, we also manage on-street parking on behalf of West Sussex County Council, which controls all of the onstreet parking schemes and policies. This includes residents parking permits, which can be ordered online **www.chichester.gov.uk/parking** 

We also manage and maintain all public conveniences within the district.

#### **Licensing and Events**

We license a range of activities including pubs, restaurants, gambling, taxis, street trading, animal boarding and breeding, zoos, riding establishments, camping sites, caravans, charitable collections, as well as skin piercing, tattooing, acupuncture, and body piercing! We also organise events, such as the Farmers' Market; Cross, Market & More, and the Summer Street Party. We chair the Safety Advisory Group (SAG), which involves all of the emergency services and oversees the safety of large events taking place in the district.









## Here to help you

#### **Business support and commercial** property

We support local businesses of all sizes and encourage businesses from outside of the area to the district and invest here investchichester.co.uk. We also manage and own a range of commercial property, including industrial estates, retail units and offices.

#### Leisure and culture

We own three leisure centres in the district in Chichester, Southbourne and Midhurst, which are run by Everyone Active. We also manage and run The Novium Museum in Chichester and support other cultural organisations including providing grants to Chichester Festival Theatre and the Pallant House Gallery. We also provide sports pitches to local community groups.

#### Parks, gardens and cemeteries

We care for and manage 117 acres of land across the district, including parks, gardens, ponds, sports pitches, play areas, local nature reserves and general open space. We also operate two cemeteries - one in Chichester and one in Petworth.

#### **Community safety**

We have a dedicated team of community wardens who operate in areas that have been identified as those most in need, assisting local communities, encouraging community involvement, and working with the police to reduce crime. They

are part funded by parish councils and housing associations. We also deal with community safety issues across the district and work closely with the police.

#### **Safety and Resilience**

The council has a critical role to play in any major community emergency, such as flooding; gas leaks; and adverse weather. It works with the emergency services, provides rest centres for evacuations and is key in the recovery stages of an emergency incident.

#### **Grants and community services**

The council operates a grants and concessions programme that focuses on three priorities – the economy; improving places and spaces; and projects that assist residents in the greatest need. The council also works in partnership with community groups and partner organisations to respond to the needs of our local communities. Included within this work, is our Choose Work scheme, which aims to help young people to access the work experience they need to help them get a job.

#### **Health and Wellbeing**

Our Wellbeing team is available to help you lose weight, become more active or stop smoking. In addition, we also have a team of Social Prescribers who are here to help if you are feeling isolated or need help accessing other support services.

#### **Environmental Health**

Our Environmental Health teams deal with food safety; noise, nuisance; fly tipping; litter; private drainage, contaminated land; pollution; air quality; sustainable travel; health and safety; and housing standards.

#### **Environmental Strategy**

Our team works with residents and businesses to help tackle climate change and make sure that the council's climate emergency actions are delivered. They also ensure that biodiversity is addressed through the planning process conditions and projects such as the strategic wildlife corridors.

#### Coastal, Land Drainage and **Foreshores**

We work in partnership with a group of neighbouring authorities in Hampshire called Coastal Partners to protect the land against coastal erosion and flooding from both the sea and rivers by making sure that sea defences are maintained or replaced when needed. We also deal with land drainage and provide a seasonal foreshore service to manage the safety of the various beach users.

#### **Elections and land charges**

Our elections team is responsible for updating the electoral register and organising any local elections. We also have a team that deals with local land charges.

#### Parish, town and city councils

In the district we have 67 parish councils. The majority are referred to as parish councils, while those located in our towns are referred to as town councils, and in the city we have Chichester City Council.

Like the county and district council, they have elected councillors who can help on local issues, such as:

- allotments
- community centres
- · play areas and play equipment
- grants to help local organisations
- · consultation on neighbourhood planning
- benches and street furniture.

You should contact your parish councils about benches, allotments, and neighbourhood plans.

#### How do I report a pothole?

#### How are you dealing with the increased traffic locally?

We are not responsible for the roads - they are managed by West Sussex County Council and National Highways (formerly known as Highways England.) However, taking account of local infrastructure needs, such as roads, is a key part of our work when planning for new housing. In this case, we employ specialist consultants to look at options and to see how impacts can be managed. We also work very closely with West Sussex County Council and National Highways who make the decisions on roads.

#### Who deals with unauthorised encampments on private land?

If on private land, it is usually the responsibility of the landowner to manage the situation. Landowners can find advice here: www.chichester.gov. **uk/gypsiesandtravellers**. As the local planning authority, we will investigate and take action if it becomes necessary.

#### Who deals with unauthorised encampments on council land?

If gypsies / travellers are camped on council land, we work closely with our partners to evict them. There is a set process which must be followed which you can find under advice for residents: www.chichester.gov.uk/ gypsiesandtravellers

#### Do you control parking charges on the highway?

This is set by West Sussex County Council. We manage on-street parking on behalf of West Sussex County Council.

#### How can I apply for a residents' parking visitor permit?

You can apply for it here: www.chichester.gov.uk/ residentvisitorpermits We issue these on the behalf of West Sussex County Council.

#### Do you control parking charges in the public car parks?

We do control the parking charges in council owned car parks. Some car parks are owned privately and their charges are set by the landowner. You can find a list of our car parks here: www.chichester.gov.uk/carparks

#### How do I apply for the housing register?

#### Do you own and manage social housing?

No. All social housing is owned, managed, and run by local housing associations. We work closely with our local housing associations. You can find out more here: www.chichester.gov.uk/ article/24521/Registered-Providers-**Development-Partners** 

#### Why can't you reduce businesses' rates and rent in the city centre?

We don't control business rates. They are set by the government and the majority of the money goes directly to the government. You can find out more about business rates here:

#### **Culture Spark** returns for 2023!

St James Industrial Estate in Westhampnett Road, Chichester – which is owned and run by Chichester District Council – now offers 30 new industrial units for businesses to rent.


The estate, which was developed on an old council depot site in the early 1980s, needed updating and is part of the council's desire to provide quality business accommodation throughout the district.

#### Get ready to vote district and parish elections 2023



#### Make sure your voice is heard

District and parish council elections will be taking place on **Thursday 4 May**. This is your chance to vote for the councillor you want to represent you on your local councils.

#### Why is it important to vote?

It gives you a say on important issues that affect you – from council tax to waste and recycling, to planning and climate change. Voting gives you a say on who represents you in your local council and in parliament.

#### How can I vote?

As long as you are registered to vote, you are able to vote in three ways:

- in person
- by post, or
- by proxy (asking someone to vote on your behalf).

The deadline to register to vote is midnight on **Monday 17 April**. If you are already registered, you do not need to register again. You can register to vote by going to **www.gov.uk/register-to-vote** 

The deadline for registering to vote by post is 5pm on **Tuesday 18 April**, you can download and complete a form and email to the elections team, but it must be signed. If you have missed the deadline to apply for a postal vote but are unable to get to the polling station on the day, you have until 5pm on **Tuesday 25 April** to apply to vote by proxy. #### Where do I vote?

If you are planning on voting in person, you should receive a polling card over the next few weeks. This will let you know where your local polling station is.

#### New for 2023 – you now need photo ID to vote

For the first time, you will now need to show photographic ID to vote at this year's local elections. Make sure that you are ready to vote in May and check that you have an accepted form of ID. Unfortunately, if you do not take an acceptable form of ID to the polling station, our poll clerks will not be allowed to issue a ballot paper to you.

You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you.

If the name on your ID is not the same name you used to register to vote, please contact our electoral services team.

Anyone who does not have one of the accepted forms of ID will be able to apply for a free voter authority certificate online at: www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate or by completing a paper application form, which is available from our elections team – please see their contact details below. Please also remember to send a digital or hard copy photo when returning it to us.

You must apply for a voter authority certificate no later than 5pm on **25 April**.



To apply for the Voter Authority Certificate, you will need to provide a photo, full name, date of birth, the address at which

they are registered to vote and your National Insurance number.

The requirement to show photo ID at the polling station, is a new requirement, introduced by the UK Government's Elections Act which was passed last year and comes into effect for the first time this May.

Anyone who wishes to have their say in the elections this May must also be registered to vote. It only takes five minutes to register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote. Voters wishing to apply to their council for free ID should first make sure they are registered to vote and do not already hold a form of acceptable ID.

### **Important** dates

Register to vote — no later than midnight on **17 April** 

- Last day to apply for a post vote 5pm on **18 April**
- Last day to apply for a proxy vote 5pm on 25 April
- Last day to apply for a Voter Authority Certificate – 5pm on 25 April

### Your council tax explained

You may be surprised to know that if you are a Band D taxpayer, we charge you just £3.48 a week for our services. Although we collect your council tax, we only keep around 8% of the amount you pay each year. Of the 92% remaining, 77% goes to West Sussex County Council, around 11% goes to Sussex Police and roughly 4% goes to parish councils. Each authority makes its own decisions about any changes.

#### Offering value for money

You come into contact with our work every day. We provide over 80 services to you, across 303 square miles. We empty your bins, check food hygiene standards, licence taxis, clean your streets, care for our parks and open spaces and provide support and reassurance to our communities.

In order to protect vital services for our residents, we have increased the average tax bill by less than 50 pence a week for a Band D property. This means that the average council taxpayer will pay just over £3.48 a week for the services we provide each day.

#### **Extra support**

We know that for people on low incomes, paying council tax on top of the cost of living can be a struggle. Our local council tax reduction scheme supports those on low incomes with up to 100% of the total cost of council tax. We also have a Discretionary Scheme to assist those

disadvantaged by the banded scheme for those in receipt of universal credit and care leavers.

This year, the Government has also provided some additional funding to councils to pay up to an additional £25 in support for those in receipt of council tax reduction. This will automatically be applied to accounts for those who are eligible as part of the billing process.

This additional funding also means that we can create our own schemes to support those impacted by the rise in cost of living. Our newly created Supporting You Team will administer this fund when agreed. It is just one of the many ways that they are able to provide practical support to those who may be struggling financially to make sure they are accessing all the support that is available. # More electric vehicle charging points are on their way!

We have recently joined a countywide scheme to help increase the number of electric vehicle charge points (EVCPs) across the district.



A number of sites, including most of our car parks, will now be considered for inclusion within the West Sussex County Council scheme, which is provided by Connected Kerb. The company will have responsibility for planning, installing, operating and maintaining all charge points on behalf of the county council and all the district and borough councils.

Two types of charge points will be installed: fast charge points (7–22 kilowatt) and rapid charge points (50+ kilowatt). Fast charge points are used for charging at home or in car parks, while the rapid charge points are intended for longer journeys or when someone needs a quick boost to their car battery's power. Electricity is generally more expensive

to buy from rapid charge points and so the different power ratings suit different charging needs.

As a council, we had already set up a network of 18 electric vehicle charging points in our own car parks across the district, using Government funding that we successfully bid for. This new scheme will enable us to further expand on this offer.

There is no cost to us in joining the countywide scheme and it is intended that Connected Kerb will work with West Sussex County Council to introduce on-street charging points across the district and West Sussex.

Research carried out by the Government has found that 99 per cent of journeys

carried out by people are less than 100 miles, and many electric vehicles being sold now give you approximately 250 miles per single charge. The focus of this project is to help increase electric vehicle infrastructure close to people's homes where residents don't have access to offstreet parking and so would otherwise be unable to charge and, as a result, run an electric car.

By 2030, the Government policy is that all new vehicles sold to be electric, and as part of our council's climate change commitment and to assist in improving local air quality, joining this scheme means that we will be able to play our part in helping more people make the move from petrol and diesel cars to electric.



It's nearly time to submit the Local Plan

Thank you to everyone who took part in the recent consultation for the Local Plan. This very specific consultation was the final stage that we had to go through before we can submit the plan. It looked at:

- legal compliance whether the plan meets the legal requirements for plan making as set out by planning laws;
- soundness has the plan been positively prepared?
   Is it justified, effective and consistent with national policy?; and
- duty to cooperate has the council engaged and worked effectively with neighbouring authorities and statutory bodies?

We are currently packaging all of your comments alongside the plan, and this will then be submitted to a Planning Inspector for independent examination on behalf of the Government. We will keep you updated on this very important piece of work. Find out more at www.chichester.gov.uk/localplan
