Social Prescribers: here to listen, here to help

Trying to find a way forward through these problems on our own can sometimes be difficult, and so our Social Prescribing Team is here to listen and work with you to plan the next step.

The service launched six years ago, and the nine-strong team supports individuals across the district, providing personalised care. The service is all about connecting people to activities, groups, and services in their community to meet the practical, social and emotional needs that affect their health and wellbeing.

The team also includes our specialist Youth Connections social prescriber who looks after clients aged 13 to 19. One social prescriber is based in each GP There may be times in our lives where we find ourselves experiencing an issue that is not medical, but which is having a serious impact on our health and wellbeing. You might feel isolated, have financial worries, be experiencing housing problems, or dealing with a traumatic event such as bereavement.

practice across the district so that doctors can identify any patients who could benefit from the service and to make the service easily accessible. In addition, residents can now also refer themselves to the service.

The team makes a huge difference to people's health and overall quality of life and each member finds it really rewarding to help people get back on their path.

Over the last year they have supported 1,200 people, which shows that there is a real need for this practical and emotional support. The social prescribers come from a variety of different backgrounds, including social care, homelessness charities and carers support.

This breadth of experience means they can assist with a wide range of needs and issues.

Our Social Prescribing service is here for you, whatever stage of life you're at.

If you're ready to move forward, whatever the issue, our team is here to listen and help you find a way to feeling healthier and more positive about the future.

Let's talk about housing

Housing is a top priority for the council. Our vision is that everyone has a safe, stable and affordable home where they can live an independent and prosperous life.

Chichester District, like the rest of the country, is facing the severe effects of a housing crisis. With over 2,200 households on the council's housing waiting list, we are developing a new housing, homelessness and rough sleeping strategy. This aims to improve

the quality, supply and affordability of new homes in the district. It will cover all types of homes, including social housing, the private rented sector and owneroccupied homes.

Working with you and our partners will be key to developing the strategy and the accompanying action plan. We have already started to talk to those who are currently using our services, as well as



key partners, such as housing associations, to shape the draft strategy. Once this is ready, we will then be consulting with all of our residents in the district, giving everyone the chance to have their say on what matters most to them when it comes to housing. We expect this to be in early 2025.

Are you over State pension age? Make sure you are not missing out on financial support.



We are urging those over State Pension age to check if they are entitled to Pension Credit.

If you are eligible and currently not claiming Pension Credit, you could be missing out on payments, which could top up pension income, help with day-today living costs and provide access to the Winter Fuel Payment.

We are especially keen to raise awareness of this following a government announcement that only those receiving Pension Credit, or other means tested benefits, will now be eligible for the Winter Fuel Payment.

The deadline to apply for Pension Credit and still receive the Winter Fuel Payment is **21 December 2024**.

"Pension Credit is one of the most underclaimed benefits, with figures indicating that nearly 900,000 households across the country have not yet claimed it," says Cllr Oona Hickson, Cabinet for Housing, and Revenues and Benefits at Chichester District Council.

"A successful application for Pension Credit will also give people automatic eligibility for the Winter Fuel Payment of up to £300. We are urging any pensioners in our district to look into this as soon as possible by visiting the Government's Pension Credit guidance online at www.gov.uk/pension-credit or by calling 0800 99 1234."

Even though someone may have modest savings, retirement income, or own their home, they may still be entitled to claim this. The scheme can also provide access to a range of other benefits such as help with housing costs — from housing benefit (if you rent the property you live in), to support for mortgage interest (if you own the property you live in). Other benefits could include help with council tax, heating bills, help with the cost of NHS services, and for those aged 75 or over, a free TV licence.

You could be eligible for Pension Credit if your weekly income is below £218.15 or, if you have a partner who lives with you, £332.95. Qualifying income level may be higher in some circumstances.

"We also want to make people aware that our Supporting You team at Chichester District Council is available to help with the process if someone is unsure of how to apply, or if they are struggling with the application," adds Oona.

"They are a dedicated team of trained advisors who work hard to make a difference to the lives of many people living across our district by helping to deal with a range of challenging issues at once. They work with services across the council to help people access a range of assistance including financial help to pay bills; help with housing; and health and wellbeing support."

The council is also encouraging people to visit their Supporting You campaign web pages at: www.chichester.gov.uk/ supportingyou. On these pages there is a link to a free benefits and budgeting calculator. The calculator helps someone to estimate their entitlement to a range of different benefits. Anyone can use this to see what support they may be eligible for. For example, it can be used by residents to compare income under both their current situation and Universal Credit. People can also save and download information about benefits and how to maximise income and see which benefits couples can claim to maximise joint income. People can then choose to share this information with an advisor, who can give additional support and provide tips on how to make savings.



NEWS in brief



Selsey coastal scheme


We've secured more than £2.9 million to develop options and outline designs for a sea defence scheme that would reduce the risk of coastal flooding and erosion along the 4km of Selsey seafront.

The money has been awarded by the Environment Agency (EA) after the council's coastal engineering service, known as Coastal Partners, carried out early feasibility work.

The current defences are now nearing the end of their life and although a lot of work has been carried out over the years to help prolong them, a long-term solution is now a priority. A detailed bid was submitted to the EA outlining the risks and asking for funding so that essential ground investigations, flood modelling and environmental assessments can start.

The new funding means we can press ahead and come up with options and designs that will allow us to bid for further funding to move forward with the work. We expect that there will be a significant funding gap, so we'll be working hard to close this, including contacting the Environment Agency to highlight funding issues. We'll also be working with other partners and the community on funding options for a long-term solution because as things stand, additional funding is necessary to unlock the government grant. Huge amounts of work will need to take place to design and fund the scheme. If successful and all goes to plan, we anticipate that construction work would start approximately six years from now. Making a difference to our wildlife



In 2021, we embarked on a project to help safeguard and enhance a series of 'strategic wildlife corridors' which will help connect the South Downs National Park to the internationally designated sites of Chichester and Pagham Harbours.

'Wildlife corridors' - including woods, hedgerows and streams - are essential for allowing species to move and migrate for food and to breed. They also provide a living landscape around the most important wildlife sites, which cannot exist in isolation, but need connections to other sites and habitats. They also allow species to adapt in response to changes, both natural and man-made, making them resilient and helping to ensure their survival over the longer term.

Strategic Wildlife Corridors Officer, Mark McManus, worked on several projects last winter and says: "We carried out a huge amount of work in partnership with local landowners, community groups and volunteers across the district and it's fantastic to see some of the projects taking shape. Some projects will take time to mature, but what we have done is laid the groundwork needed to help attract and encourage wildlife and enable it to flourish."

Coir rolls in the Hambrook stream

Along the bankside of the Hambrook, 70 three-metre-long coir rolls were installed, featuring a mixture of around 700 native aquatic plants. This will increase the aquatic plant diversity for invertebrates and provide additional habitat for rare water voles. Coir rolls also help to filter the water of impurities that flow downstream towards Nutbourne and Chichester Harbour. The rolls will also help create better structure as the banks are eroded.

Hedgerows and hedge-laying at **Oldwick Farm, Lavant**

More than 1.5km of linear native hedgerow and tree species were planted across the paddocks at Oldwick Farm. This helped link up two parcels of ancient woodland through a paddocked area that had been previously used for gravel extraction. Species planted included Field Maple, Hawthorn, Blackthorn, Hazel and Spindle. Within five years the hedgerow will thicken and mature into a wonderful habitat for nesting farmland birds such as Linnets and Yellowhammers, while also providing a home for invertebrates and small mammals.

We also laid over 100 metres of existing hedge. Using the 'South of England' style, volunteers used stakes and binders sourced locally from West Dean woods. They used tools to partially cut through and bend the line of hedge or small trees near ground level but without breaking them. This has rejuvenated and encouraged new growth from the base. Over time the hedgerow will thicken and become a much stronger structure providing habitat for many species of wildlife.

Native tree planting, Patricia Way, Nutbourne

We provided over 100 native hedgerow whips that have been planted by local volunteers in and around this community green space. Tree saplings have also been planted including Black Poplar, Alder,

Guelder Rose and Goat Willow which all thrive in the wetter conditions that this area experiences in the winter.

Providing nestboxes and bat boxes at Old Bridge Meadow, Bosham

Last winter we installed 10 nest boxes of different designs to attract a variety of species. These were kindly made for us by the Chichester Men's Shed volunteers. It was extremely rewarding to see the nestboxes being used this spring by Robins, Blue Tits and Great Tits, which all successfully raised young chicks. We also put two bat boxes up in an area that is frequented by Common and Soprano Pipistrelle bats. Hopefully, the bats will use these to roost in.

Installing dormouse boxes at Maybush Reserve, Chidham

Several dormouse boxes were placed within this hazel copse, and in a nearby area of private land. We hope that the local dormouse population will start using these to roost and breed in, which will help increase the numbers of this declining mammal.

Dead hedging at Rolls Royce Motor Cars, Westhampnett

We worked with staff volunteers on the land adjoining the factory at Westhampnett, to help enhance the site's nature reserve. This involved creating structures using stakes and binders and then filling the spaces with cuttings, dead foliage and branches - a practice called

'dead hedging'. This creates a thick, natural structure that is used by birds, small mammals, reptiles and insects. We'll be continuing enhancement work over winter to create more bio-diverse habitats.

Keep your dog close in Chichester Harbour

Dog owners are being encouraged to ensure their dogs are close with them when walking in Chichester Harbour, to help protect the site's internationally important over-wintering wading birds.

"We know that people love their dogs and want to walk them along Chichester Harbour," says Councillor Jonathan Brown, Cabinet Member for Environmental Strategy at Chichester District Council. "However, research indicates that during the winter period, when dogs are off the lead and enjoying themselves, they can unintentionally disturb the winter migrating birds that feed on the ground in the harbour. These birds are internationally protected and need to build up enough energy to fly back to their summer breeding grounds.

"When a dog comes along, the birds will naturally fear a predator and either stop feeding or fly away to escape. Unfortunately, these disturbances harm the birds because they use all their energy flying away when they need to be on the ground feeding and conserving energy – it can take a bird a whole day to refuel the energy lost.

"This means that they are not gaining enough weight to survive the summer migration. Short daylight hours in winter, plus the fact that many of these birds feed at low tide, mean that feeding time is limited, so it's vital that disturbances are minimised. Unfortunately, the cumulative impact has a serious effect, and we want to raise awareness among dog owners so that humans, dogs and wildlife can co-exist. We're asking dog owners to make sure they know where the sensitive parts of the harbour are, and to ensure their dogs are close by them."

Chichester District Council is a member of Bird Aware Solent, a partnership of coastal local councils and conservation bodies from Selsey to the New Forest. The aim is to help people enjoy the coast without disturbing the thousands of birds that over winter there.

The Bird Aware Coastal Code

- Look out for birds feeding or resting on the coast.
- Take care not to scare or disturb them.
- Move further away if birds become alert and stop feeding.
- Stay on paths where they exist.
- Always follow requests on signs.
- Exercise your dog away from coastal birds to avoid disturbing them.
- Keep your dog in sight and on a short lead if you cannot rely on its obedience.
- Please clean up after your dog.
- If you are going out on the water contact the local harbour authority for special guidance.







How to get your home weather ready this winter

As we all know, our weather is becoming more unsettled through the year. During the winter months, we've been seeing much more rain which can increase the risk of flooding, along with sudden cold spells and extreme weather. This is why it's so important that we are prepared.

There are several things we can all do to make sure our homes, gardens and businesses are ready for the months ahead and so we have collated some useful tips and information.



Know what to do in a power cut

During extreme weather, power cuts may occur. If this happens, you must contact your electricity Distribution Network Operator by calling 105, and someone will put you through to your area operator.

Check if you're at risk of long-term flooding

Check the flood risk for your postcode area at: www.gov.uk/check-long-term-flood-risk.

Sign up for flood warnings

In many flood risk areas, you can sign up for flood warnings by visiting: www.gov. uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings. These warn of the risk of flooding from rivers, the sea and groundwater. You can receive alerts by phone, email, or text when flooding is expected. Please note that these alerts are not available in all areas.

Know how to turn off your gas, water, and electricity supply

Familiarise yourself with where your mains water, gas and electricity shut-off is, in case you need to leave your home because of flooding. The location of these varies between properties. Gas shut-off valves

are normally beside the meter. The mains electricity cut-off is usually a big red switch on your fuse box. If you can't find your water stopcock, ask someone with practical experience or a plumber to help you.

Are you insured?

Sometimes no amount of planning and preparation can stop weather events from damaging your property. Insurance offers peace of mind so you know that whatever happens, your home and property is covered. Ensure your policy is up-to-date and covers what you need.

Protect your property

When high winds are forecast, remember that this can turn everyday items like garden furniture and chairs into dangerous objects. Make sure they are secure or stored away before a storm or when high winds are forecast.

Check your roof and guttering

Before it gets windy or a storm hits, check your roof for loose tiles, slates and flashing. It's also worth removing dead branches from old trees. In winter, leaves can build up in your guttering and drainpipes. As a result, water may not drain away properly and will leak into the roof and sides of your house, so do consider having your gutters cleared.

Insulate water pipes and tanks

Be prepared for cold weather and make sure water pipes and water tanks in your property are covered with good quality insulation. This will help insulate your hot water system, helping you to save money and protect them from freezing.

Make a list of numbers you'll need in an emergency, including local services and loved ones.

Print or write them on paper just in case the situation means you can't use your mobile phone.

The project was given the go-ahead by councillors in July, who approved a total budget of £814,000 to refurbish play parks at Sherborne Road; Whyke Oval; the Amphitheatre; Priory Park; Florence Park; and Oaklands Park.

"Outside play areas are vital to help our children develop physically, socially, creatively and emotionally, and I know that this project will make a huge difference to families and children across the area," says Councillor Mark Chilton, Cabinet Member for Contract Services at Chichester District Council.

"The level of work required in these play areas varies. At some of sites the equipment has been there a long time and is very worn, so we'll need to replace it, while a couple of areas will need more of a light touch refurbishment.

"We'll also be looking to enhance certain areas by installing some inclusive play equipment which can be used by disabled children and those with health conditions and impairments."

Over the summer holidays members of the council's Green Spaces team spent time in

each play area identified for refurbishment, talking to children, parents, and carers about how they use the play equipment, and asked for ideas and comments which will be used to help shape proposals.

"We received a really positive response to our initial consultation, and we'd like to thank everyone we spoke to who took the time to give us their thoughts and ideas," adds Cllr Chilton. "The team will now be working with play area specialists on a series of proposals and which we'll share with members of the public as part of a second stage of consultation."

Refurbishing toilets in the district

We've just finished a major project to refurbish several key public toilet sites in the district to ensure that our facilities are of a high standard for residents and visitors.

Work was carried out to Market Avenue and Priory Park in Chichester; East Beach in Selsey; and, Bosham to install new flooring, tiling, and sanitary ware. Some of the sites now also have solar panels and LED lights fitted which are more efficient and better for the environment. All the sites also have new disabled facilities that meet modern legislation.

In addition, councillors have approved budget to replace the public toilets and provide associated landscaping in Tower Street, Chichester. They have agreed a new facility consisting of three toilets, including a disabled access toilet, plus a 'pocket park' and bicycle storage.


"The existing toilet block in Tower Street has severe structural and subsidence issues which were highlighted last year as part of our current refurbishment project,"

explains Councillor John Cross, Cabinet Member for Culture, Sport and Place at Chichester District Council. "Putting these issues right would have cost the council significant amounts of money to resolve, and so several options were put forward for the site.

"As a council, we felt it was really important for our residents and visitors to keep public toilet facilities on the site, and so we investigated the option of using direct access toilets (also known as modular toilets).

"I'm very pleased that as a council we are still able to invest in this service for our residents and visitors and I'm delighted that this year's refurbishment project has been completed, with work on the Tower Street site to begin shortly."



Scrutinising our work

You've probably have heard of our Cabinet, Full Council, Planning Committee and Licensing Committee meetings, but you may not be so familiar with the work of another key committee – the Overview and Scrutiny Committee.

The Overview and Scrutiny Committee (often referred to as O&S) performs a key function by reviewing existing council policy and decisions and holds executive and Cabinet members to account. It has also the power to ask for a decision taken by the Cabinet to be reconsidered before it is introduced.

While the Committee has no 'formal' power to force anyone to make changes, it can help influence decisions and encourage the executive to implement recommendations.



The committee can require any member of the council's Cabinet, chief officer, and /or any divisional manager to attend to explain a decision concerning their area of responsibility.

It can also invite other public sector or public service officials, external partners and/or residents and stakeholders to address it, discuss issues of local concern and/or answer questions. Recommendations may be made to the Cabinet or directly to Council. If scrutinising an external partner or partnership, recommendations may be made directly to that body.

"The committee plays a really important role in addressing issues which are fundamental to our communities and ensures openness and transparency in how decisions are made," explains Committee Chair, Councillor Donna Johnson. "Our role is to be a critical, but supportive friend, and identify where policies and decisions impacting our residents can be improved.

"The last year has been extremely interesting and informative. A key piece of work was inviting the Sussex Police and

Crime Commissioner Katy Bourne along, so that we could raise various concerns. We discussed a range of issues, including police resourcing, road safety and antisocial driving and rural crime.

"Other work has involved finding out more about the work of the Chichester BID (Business Improvement District) and how they are supporting businesses who pay the BID levy. We've also been looking at the Social Prescribing service and hearing about Coastal Partners and their role in protecting our district's coastal areas."

The committee has invited the head of West Sussex County Council's Highways Department to attend the meeting in December and over the next year work will include monitoring and reviewing the work around the Southern Gateway project and the council's budget.
