

Shippam's

Behind every jar of potted paste was a person, a story – and a city. One of Chichester's most beloved brands is stepping back into the spotlight with a major new exhibition at The Novium Museum, opening 12 July 2025.

Famous for their potted meat and fish pastes, Shippam's was a household name for over two centuries. But behind the iconic glass jars was a deeply local story – of family, community, and innovation.

Thanks to a £44,593 grant from Arts Council England, the museum has been working with volunteers and the community to unlock the extraordinary advertising archive from Shippam's which forms part of the collection at The Novium Museum.

The result is a vibrant, nostalgic, and at times surprising exhibition that explores not just what Shippam's made, but who they were — and why the company meant so much to so many.

Founded in 1786, Shippam's grew from a local grocer into a global food manufacturer – exporting products around the world while remaining proudly rooted in Chichester.

Known for looking after their staff, Shippam's became a cherished local employer.

Generations of families worked there. Schoolleavers found lifelong careers. Couples met in the social clubs. Loyalty ran deep. For many, it wasn't just work – it was family.

This exhibition brings the story of Shippam's to life through rarely-seen photographs, quirky advertising, colourful packaging, and objects from life on the factory floor. You'll hear from the people

who worked on the lines, packed jars, and operated the switchboards – with their voices collected through new oral histories. Visitors of all ages can even explore archaeological finds from the old East Walls factory site. Children can get hands-on with interactive drawers, explore a Shippam's play shop, handle real museum objects, and enjoy themed activities within the exhibition. A series of free family days will also run throughout the summer holidays, offering Shippam's-inspired craft sessions.

Whether you remember the advertising jingles, worked at the factory, or are just curious to explore a truly local legacy, this exhibition offers something for everyone. Come and uncover the story of Chichester's 'Ace of Pastes'—and rediscover a slice of history that's anything but bland.

Admission is free, with donations welcome.

Refurbishment of play areas begins!

Our exciting £800,000 project to refurbish several district councilrun play areas is well underway and nearing completion.

Work to update Priory Park, Sherborne Road and Whyke Oval began in June following a 'light touch' refurbishment of Florence Road play area in March. Once the current phase of work has concluded then our specialist contractors will move on to Oaklands Park.

We anticipate that this work will be finished by the beginning of the summer holidays, ready for little ones across the area to have fun!

Work on the Amphitheatre play area will begin once we have approval from Historic England. If approved, work is likely to take place late summer or early autumn.

"We know that outside play areas are vital for helping our children develop physically, socially, creatively and emotionally, and so it's important that they are in top condition," says Councillor Mark Chilton, Cabinet Member

for Finance, Corporate Services and Chichester Contract Services at Chichester District Council. "Once refurbished, the new and improved play areas will offer an experience for a range of ages and abilities, including the opportunity to learn, interact, imagine and play together.

"It's really important to us that all of the sites are open and accessible to everyone, and so our plans feature a range of inclusive play equipment. To help with this, we have worked closely with a local children's charity, Parents and Carers Support Organisation (PACSO), and incorporated their feedback into the designs.

"I'd also like to thank everyone who took part in our consultation. We received some really useful comments, and the designs were refined to take account of these.

"Our plans also include enhancing Oaklands Park so that it becomes a flagship 'destination' play area. To help deliver this particular part of the project, we are working in partnership with Chichester City Council. Usually larger than an average play park, a destination play area, offers a unique, engaging and exciting experience for all, with a wide range of creative play equipment to entertain people for a longer period of time.

"This type of play area serves as a 'day out' for local residents as well as visitors from further afield who will travel for the bespoke experience. We believe our plans for Oaklands Park will benefit our local communities, while also acting as an attractive draw to the city for those outside the area, which will help to support the local economy."

We're busy preparing for your new food waste recycling collection service!



From Spring 2026, we will start rolling out a new weekly food waste recycling collection for households. Implementing a new service like this is a big job, and requires a lot of forward planning, but we are excited to have placed orders for our trucks. caddies and bins. Our first truck has already arrived with the remaining fleet to arrive later this year.

Each household will receive a small food waste caddy to use in the kitchen and a larger bin for outdoor collection. These will be distributed next year in time for the service rollout, which will take place between March and the end of May 2026. The rollout for properties who share communal bins will start later in the year and more information will be released nearer the time.

Food waste collections will be every week, with all household recycling, waste, and garden waste (if subscribed to) continuing as usual every two weeks.

Currently, about a third of the waste in the average household bin in the district is food. By collecting food waste separately, it can be recycled through Anaerobic Digestion – a process where food waste is broken down to produce biogas and bio-fertiliser and is a much more efficient and environmentally friendly way of processing.

The new service is also expected to encourage residents to reduce their

food waste, potentially saving around £20 per person per month. For tips on how to reduce your food waste please visit www.westsussex.gov.uk/ fightagainstfoodwaste

To help you prepare, we are encouraging you to download our free Chichester District App from either the Apple or Google Play store and turn on your notifications. This is the best way to receive regular, tailored updates about your bin collections. By turning on notifications, you can get reminders and updates specific to your collection schedule and stay up to date with information on the new service rollout. 

Over £800,000 allocated to support projects across the district

Over the past year, we've been pleased to allocate more than £800,000 of grant funding to help deliver a range of projects that encourage economic growth and improve quality of life across the Chichester District.







We've supported 65 grant-funded projects in the last 12 months, following a successful bid to the government three years ago in which we secured money from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund and Rural England Prosperity Fund.

The UK Shared Prosperity Fund aims to boost economic growth and improve quality of life by funding projects that invest in communities and place, local businesses, and people and skills. The Rural England Prosperity Fund is for projects that support businesses and community infrastructure to address challenges faced by rural areas.

"It's fantastic to see the amazing variety of projects that we've been able to support with this funding, from small charities to growing businesses and community organisations," says Councillor John Cross, Cabinet Member for Culture, Sport and Place at Chichester District Council.

"During the previous year, 23 projects were approved in our area, all of which were successfully completed by April 2024. Since then, we've been issuing many more grants as part of a second round of funding. I'm pleased to say that we've been able to support a further 65 grant-funded projects, which were all completed throughout the year.

"These varied and exciting projects are already making a huge difference to our businesses and community groups, helping them to expand their customer offer and allowing them more flexibility. Some of the businesses have also been able to keep jobs in our district and increase staff posts, supporting our local economy and ensuring that our communities continue to thrive."

Here are some of the recently completed projects that have benefited from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

The Selsey Community Forum

Grant funding was awarded to this local initiative to provide one-to-one support that helps people of all ages and situations to find voluntary work or paid employment. The service includes help with CV writing, interview practice and signposting to available courses.

Manhood Wildlife and **Heritage Group**

This community group was issued funding to help people connect with part of our district's local history. The group produced a film recounting the fascinating but illfated story of the Selsey Tramway, which was featured in an exhibition on the same topic at The Novium Museum in Chichester www.thenovium.org.uk/selseytramway

Berries on Tap

This is one of many businesses that successfully bid for a grant to help install renewable energy features with the aim of reducing environmental impact and energy costs. Berries on Tap provides locally grown produce and locally produced goods. They installed a solar panel to their innovative customer vending machine, which is helping them to grow the retail side of their business.

Chichester Racquets and Fitness Club

A grant was used to part-fund a project that enabled this sports club to upgrade all of the existing flood lights to LEDs at the Chichester tennis and padel courts, which means that more people can benefit from these valuable facilities.



Shore Watersports

Based in East Wittering, Shore Watersports, used their grant to install solar panels to their warehouse and to purchase a battery to store the energy generated. They are now 73% selfpowered and the battery ensures they can continue operations if the mains power supply is interrupted.

The Rural England Prosperity Fund has supported a variety of different businesses, including:

Legend Presents

A new arena, viewing area and a coffee shack were created to support Legend Presents' annual jousting festival in Loxwood. Following a successful 2024, the organisation is intending to employ more people and for longer this year.

Axiom Product Development

Axiom Product Development used this funding to develop their business by purchasing a large-scale 3D printer, which has increased capacity and resulted in a new job role.

Directly delivered projects

We've also been able to use funding from the UK Shared Prosperity scheme to support a number of council initiatives. In the past year, we've directly delivered a range of free community events, including the popular Chichester Laser Light Shows and some brand-new events, such as 'Skate, Scoot and Bike' in Chichester, and the Good Food For All 'Feastival' in the city centre. We've also

supported free events in rural areas of the district including the Petworth Laser Light Show and Midhurst March Mayhem.

We're pleased to say that we've been allocated further UK Shared Prosperity and Rural England Prosperity funding for the year 2025-2026, and a number of direct delivery projects that will benefit our local communities are already underway!

New Park celebrates its 50th anniversary!

For half a century the New Park Centre In 2010, a project to develop a has been at the heart of Chichester, offering a space for people to 'connect, create and celebrate' and currently offers more than 100 arts, sports and community activities to people each week, and is also home to the Chichester Cinema.

The centre stands on the site of the former Sussex Central School for Boys, which was established in 1818. In 1888, it became the Central Junior Church of England Boys' School, until the school was relocated in 1964.

In 1968, the building was saved as a community centre and is now leased from Chichester District Council by New Park Community & Arts Association.

new building to provide even more facilities, began, which Chichester District Council supported with over £1 million of funding.

This year, the centre has been holding a packed programme of events to celebrate their 50-year milestone. A children's art competition launched the festivities, with the winning artwork exhibited in the Cafe Bar. The Centre held mini 'Heart of New Park' festivals' as part of The Fringe and The Festival of Chichester. Local schools and the wider community are being invited to contribute to time capsules capturing life in 2025; and in August, local historian Alan Green will be giving a talk on the history



of the New Park site and there will be an exhibition of photographs, memorabilia, and personal stories from the past five decades. Other planned events are an arts programme throughout August and a gala weekend in September.

WE LIVE AND WORK IN ONE OF THE MOST BEAUTIFUL PLACES IN THE COUNTRY AND WE ARE ASKING FOR YOUR HELP TO KEEP IT THAT WAY.

Each year we spend over £1 million keeping our district clean and tidy, as well as cleaning up after those who are spoiling our environment.

We believe that by reducing fly tipping, dog fouling and littering, some of this money could be saved and spent on other important community services. As a result, we are relaunching our awardwinning Against Litter campaign.

We look after 303 square miles across the district, which is a huge area, and one of the largest district areas in the country. As you can appreciate, we can't cover such a large area every day and so we need your help too!

There are lots of people across our district who have taken part in our successful **Adopt an Area** scheme, where individuals and groups have pledged to look after a particular area of the district by undertaking litter picking on a regular basis.

The areas adopted have included all kinds of spaces, from just a single road or grass verge, to a whole village, a community green space, shop frontage or other area. As part of the campaign, we ask people signing the pledge to commit to one or more of the following:

• encourage people to take pride in their local area.

- report any problems to us, such as fly tipping, extensive littering or continuous issues of dog fouling in your local area.
- help keep the area clean by getting involved in, or organising, community clear ups.

We are not asking you to do our job for us. Instead, we are asking for your support and to be our eyes and ears in your local community.

By working with you, we will be able to better respond to the issues facing our district by:

- identifying litter, dog fouling and fly tipping hotspots and taking action;
- encouraging more people to support our campaign;
- bringing our communities together; and
- most importantly, protecting our beautiful district.

PLEASE TAKE YOUR LITTER HOME

With summer in full swing, we're sure you will be enjoying plenty of picnics, barbecues and other outdoor get togethers. One of the best things we can all do to help keep our green areas, countryside and beaches in tip top condition is to take your litter home and encourage others to do the same.

As you can imagine, with all the packaging that comes with these occasions, our public litter bins fill up quickly – especially during the summer. People can help by holding onto their rubbish and taking it home to recycle or dispose of responsibly.

ROADSIDE WASTE

Unfortunately, our district experiences a high volume of roadside litter which people have thrown from their vehicles.

In addition, there is a lot of waste that comes from trade vehicles and so we are encouraging tradespeople to ensure that everything on the back of their trucks is secured with netting.

REPORT IT

If you see someone throwing litter from their car onto the roadside, please do report this at: www.chichester.gov.uk/againstlitter

If you have dashcam footage that clearly shows the car registration plate, then this would be really helpful to send us.

When making a report on our website we'll also need a brief statement from you about what you saw, the time, date and a description of what happened.

The more specific and detailed the information you provide then the more likely we are able to take action. By working together, we can all help to keep our communities looking clean.

Tower Street Toilets are open again after major refurbishment

We're excited to share that the refurbishment of the Tower Street public toilets in Chichester is now complete! This is part of a wider upgrade programme we've been rolling out across several sites in the district.

Not only have the toilets been modernised, but we've also added a lovely little 'pocket park'. It also has new planting, bike racks, a notice board, a bench, and even some informative displays about Chichester's rich history. It's all about creating a space that's not just practical, but also pleasant and welcoming.

This is one of five sites we've recently improved, alongside East Beach in Selsey, Bosham Lane in Bosham, Market Road in Chichester, and Priory Park in Chichester. All of these have been upgraded to ensure they meet the latest accessibility requirements in line with the Equality Act, especially for people with disabilities and older residents.

We've also made sure the facilities are more eco-friendly, with energy-saving lighting, efficient handwashing equipment, and solar panels fitted where possible to help cut down on carbon emissions. Plus, the new designs are built to last, with better drainage and features that help prevent vandalism.

Even though councils aren't required by law to provide public toilets, we know how important they are for both the local community and visitors. We've already had some great feedback from people using the new facilities, and we're really proud of the difference these improvements are making.

Community Wardens mark 20-year milestone!



Our Community Wardens are proudly celebrating 20 years of dedicated service to our communities.

The wardens started in 2005, initially as a two-year pilot programme, to help community development and serve as a link to key services such as the police. Since then, they have been a trusted presence, supporting and strengthening our communities. The team currently consists of Jon, Community Warden for Chichester East; Carol, Community Warden for Chichester South; Sue, Community Warden for Chichester West; Dawn, Community Warden for The Witterings and Bracklesham; Rich, Community Warden for Selsey; Jimmy, Community Warden for Tangmere and Oving, and Barry who has recently joined as Community Warden for Chichester city centre.

Over the past two decades, the wardens have played a key role in bringing their communities together, helping to deal with environmental issues; working with services to help reduce crime and antisocial behaviour; as well as offering a reassuring presence in their area.

During this time, the wardens have worked within their communities on a wide range of projects, from a nationally recognised junior wardens programme which was led by Sue and was recognised by the then Home

Secretary, through to more recent projects such as installing key safes to support vulnerable people in Selsey, and a campaign that aims to help protect people from scams.

The wardens, whose backgrounds range from working for the police and security focused jobs, through to retail, hospitality, and teaching, find that their previous roles have helped them to deal with the various issues they are asked to help with.

Carol, who has been a Community Warden for 19 years, says: "We always set out to do the best we can and help where possible. No matter what it is, it's always very fulfilling when we can help a resident reach a solution or resolve an issue. Quite often though, we find people just want to talk with us and be heard."

The wardens never know what issues might come up, for example, Sue once had a call to help herd a flock of swans out of the road and back into their pond for safety. Meanwhile, Dawn had a call on her first day as Community Warden for Bracklesham and The Witterings, about a boat that had come untethered in the harbour.

Over the years, the nature of the role has changed, as Dawn explains: "In the first

few years, we found that the common issues were things like graffiti and litter, but since the pandemic, we've noticed that it's shifted to more community and neighbour issues, and directing residents to where they can get support. We also spend a lot of time with elderly residents who may feel lonely, and we do our best to make sure they are supported."

The team face different challenges every day, however, last year was an unexpectedly tough time for the team, as Community Wardens Declan Moody and Drew Allardice sadly passed away. Declan and Drew had been with the wardens right from the start and were huge characters who were loved and respected by everyone they came into contact with. Their memory will live on through the team as they continue to help residents feel safe and reassured.

At the end of 2024, local business, Mud Foods, affectionately known as Mud Pies by many, moved into our new £6 million St James Industrial Estate. We speak to owner Christian Barrington about his inspirational business journey over the last 16 years and his return to the 'spiritual home' where he first launched his business.

Since starting out making pies in Unit 19 at the old St James' site in 2009, Christian and Mud Foods have been on the most amazing journey and have come full circle, back to where it all began. When he first started out, it was back in the days when most of the businesses at the site had to share a toilet block, although Christian was lucky as his unit had its own - plus hot and cold running water!

"I started off with 200 pie tins and within a year we had 1,500 tins and had already outgrown the space at St James," explains Christian, who at this time was selling his produce at a range of local famers' markets including Chichester Farmers' Market. "So, then I looked for new premises and found a site in Wedglen Park, Midhurst which was four times the size of the unit we were in and that's where we stayed for 13 or so years."

Mud Foods is a very family-oriented business. For many years, Christian's parents-in-law have played multiple roles over the years, but now focus mainly on picking and packing, and this family ethos still runs throughout the business. While based in Midhurst, Christian went on to purchase the building so that he could tailor it to his business needs. Mud Foods evolved and expanded to include supplying their pies and quiches to high quality farm shops, delicatessens, restaurants, pubs and caterers. For the last five or six years, they have also been supplying products to Southern Co-op. During Covid, Christian saw an opportunity to improve the business' online service and applied for one of our council's business grants to improve his website, which was an exciting development.

In 2022, Christian and his Mud Pies beat hundreds of competitors to become Aldi's Next Big Thing, appearing on the Channel 4 television programme and then seeing their pies in stores across the country. Christian's products were then in such demand, he again started looking

"We really did have to move - I'd turned my own office into a pastry room, and ended up working from the staff room table! We were also having issues with electricity capacity, so discovering the redevelopment at St James was a game changer.

"Our new unit at St James means we have the capacity to access new markets. It will allow us to expand our ranges and bring back products we stopped making when we had to focus on producing the volume needed for other product lines.

"The new site is worlds apart from our previous accommodation – the big difference is the infrastructure - the road and rail links close to the site are really important. It's also more accessible for our wonderful staff and provides an improved environment for the whole team.

"Thinking about how we started all those years ago and where are now and where we are going, coming back to St lames and coming full circle like this, it gives such a big, warm feeling - we've come back to our spiritual home." But despite Mud Foods' growth, our founding ethos and values remain unchanged to this day - crafting pies and fine pastries using the very best local ingredients from our doorstep, including meats and dairy from Goodwood, West Dean, and the South Downs.

Research progresses into decline of Selsey fishing catches

Research to investigate whether sediment is one of the reasons behind the decline in crab and lobster catches off the Selsey coast is progressing thanks to a key report which has been completed. The report carried out by the University of Southampton was commissioned by The CHASM project (Crustaceans, Habitat and Sediment Movement) which is led by Chichester District Council. Funding released for pump

track in Petworth

A total of £70,000 is being released for a pump track in Petworth. The funding was approved at the February meeting of the council's Cabinet. The project will be led by Petworth Town Council in partnership with local landowners, subject to all the relevant planning permissions being in place. For over 10 years, both the district and town council have been working to find a suitable site for a skate park, but unfortunately an appropriate location was never identified. Last year, Petworth Town Council was asked to come up with alternative ways to use the money, and so they put forward the idea for a pump track, and the funds were re-allocated.

New housing register and advice system introduced

A new online housing applications system, which makes applying to join our district's housing register quicker and easier has just been launched.

The new Chichester Home Move system has been introduced in direct response to customer feedback and offers a more personalised approach. Residents can now 'bid' for available properties that meet their needs more often. It also means that housing associations

(known as Registered Providers) can add vacant homes as soon as they become available. The changes will increase the opportunities for people to find a suitable home.

The new system also makes it quicker and simpler for people who need to contact the council to seek housing advice, or to access support if they are homeless or are facing homelessness. Find out more at www.chichester.gov.uk/housing



New housing strategy for Chichester District

Intervening early to prevent homelessness and end rough sleeping; improving housing standards across the private housing sector; and, supporting work to improve the energy efficiency of homes, are some of the key aims of a new housing strategy adopted by Chichester District Council. The five-year Housing, Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Strategy was agreed at April's Full Council meeting.

It sets out how the council will continue to work with partners to prevent people from becoming homeless; create and retain affordable housing for young people and families; address the housing needs of older people; and improve housing standards for all residents in the district. The future of local services in West Sussex

Changes are coming to the way your local councils operate.

Currently, some services such as education, social care and roads are run by the county council, while others, like bin collections, planning and housing, are run by our council.

The national government wants to simplify that system – combining councils into unitary councils, so that one council delivers all services in your area. This is called Local Government Reorganisation.

We have been working closely with the other councils in West Sussex to consider how this could look. The Government is expecting to see the creation of new unitary councils that will manage all local services.

All of the councils in West Sussex must submit their proposals to the government by 26 September. We are committed to ensuring that these plans reflect what matters most to you. To find out more about this, please visit: www.chichester. gov.uk/devolution

The government has provided a framework to help us develop options that are financially sustainable and aim to enhance local services. We are currently gathering data and feedback, as well as conducting

research to support this. Alongside other councils in West Sussex, we will use this evidence to develop proposals for the government to consider. The government will consult with you on the options and will then make a final decision.

If approved, the government expects the new councils to operate in a shadow form by 2027, with full implementation by 2028.

We want to assure you that regardless of the outcome, our services will continue
